

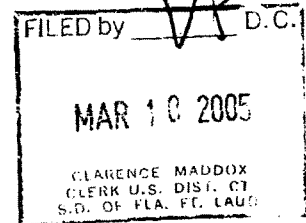

PLEA AGREEMENT

The United States of America and SALVATORE ARGENTO (hereinafter referred to as the "defendant") enter into the following agreement:

1. The defendant agrees to plead guilty to count two (2) of the indictment, which charges the defendant with conspiracy to violate the mail and wire fraud statutes in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 371.

2. The United States agrees to seek dismissal of counts one (1) and three (3) of the indictment, as to this defendant, after sentencing.

3. The defendant is aware that the sentence will be imposed by the court after considering the Federal Sentencing Guidelines and Policy Statements (hereinafter "Sentencing Guidelines"). The defendant acknowledges and understands that the court will compute an advisory sentence under the Sentencing Guidelines and that the applicable guidelines will be determined by the court relying in part on the results of a Pre-Sentence Investigation by the court's probation office, which investigation will commence after the guilty plea has been entered. The defendant is also aware that,

under certain circumstances, the court may depart from the advisory sentencing guideline range that it has computed, and may raise or lower that advisory sentence under the Sentencing Guidelines. The defendant is further aware and understands that the court is required to consider the advisory guideline range determined under the Sentencing Guidelines, but is not bound to impose that sentence; the court is permitted to tailor the ultimate sentence in light of other statutory concerns, and such sentence may be either more severe or less severe than the Sentencing Guidelines' advisory sentence. Knowing these facts, the defendant understands and acknowledges that the court has the authority to impose any sentence within and up to the statutory maximum authorized by law for the offense identified in paragraph one (1) of this agreement and that the defendant may not withdraw the plea solely as a result of the sentence imposed.

4. The defendant also understands and acknowledges that the court may impose a statutory maximum term of imprisonment of up to five (5) years, followed by a term of supervised release of up to three (3) years. In addition to a term of imprisonment and supervised release, the court may impose a fine of up to \$250,000. The defendant understands and agrees that the Court may order restitution in the amount of \$13 million.

5. The defendant further understands and acknowledges that, in addition to any sentence imposed under paragraph four (4) of this agreement, a special assessment in the amount of \$100 will be imposed on the defendant. The defendant agrees that any special assessment imposed shall be paid at the time of sentencing.

6. The Office of the United States Attorney for the Southern District of Florida (hereinafter "Office") reserves the right to inform the court and the probation office of all facts pertinent to the sentencing process, including all relevant information concerning the offenses committed, whether

charged or not, as well as concerning the defendant and the defendant's background. Subject only to the express terms of any agreed-upon sentencing recommendations contained in this agreement, this Office further reserves the right to make any recommendation as to the quality and quantity of punishment.

7. Although not binding on the probation office or the court, the United States and the defendant agree that, except as otherwise expressly contemplated in this Plea Agreement, they will jointly recommend that the court neither depart upward nor depart downward when determining the sentence in this case.

8. The United States agrees that it will recommend at sentencing that the court reduce by three (3) levels the sentencing guideline level applicable to the defendant's offense, pursuant to Section 3E1.1 of the Sentencing Guidelines, based upon the defendant's recognition and affirmative and timely acceptance of personal responsibility. However, the United States will not be required to make this sentencing recommendation if the defendant: (1) fails or refuses to make full, accurate and complete disclosure to the probation office of the circumstances surrounding the relevant offense conduct; (2) is found to have misrepresented facts to the government prior to entering this plea agreement; or (3) commits any misconduct after entering into this plea agreement, including but not limited to committing a state or federal offense, violating any term of release, or making false statements or misrepresentations to any governmental entity or official.

9. The defendant agrees that he shall cooperate fully with this Office by:

(a) providing truthful and complete information and testimony, and producing documents, records and other evidence, when called upon by this Office, whether in interviews, before a grand jury, or at any trial or other court proceeding; and

(b) appearing at such grand jury proceedings, hearings, trials, and other judicial proceedings, and at any meetings, as may be required by this Office.

10. This Office reserves the right to evaluate the nature and extent of the defendant's cooperation and to make the defendant's cooperation, or lack thereof, known to the court at the time of sentencing. If in the sole and unreviewable judgment of this Office the defendant's cooperation is of such quality and significance to the investigation or prosecution of other criminal matters as to warrant the court's downward departure from the advisory sentence calculated under the Sentencing Guidelines, this Office may at or before sentencing make a motion consistent with the intent of Section 5K1.1 of the Sentencing Guidelines prior to sentencing, or Rule 35 of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure subsequent to sentencing, reflecting that the defendant has provided substantial assistance and recommending that the defendant's sentence be reduced from the advisory sentence suggested by the Sentencing Guidelines. The defendant acknowledges and agrees, however, that nothing in this Agreement may be construed to require this Office to file such a motion(s) and that this Office's assessment of the nature, value, truthfulness, completeness, and accuracy of the defendant's cooperation shall be binding insofar as the appropriateness of this Office's filing of such a motion is concerned.

11. The defendant understands and acknowledges that the Court is under no obligation to grant the motion referred to in paragraph 10 of this agreement should the government exercise its discretion to file such a motion. The defendant also understands and acknowledges that the court is under no obligation to reduce the defendant's sentence because of the defendant's cooperation.

12. The United States and the defendant agree that, although not binding on the probation office or the court, they will jointly recommend that the court make the following findings and conclusions as to the sentence to be imposed:

a. Loss: That the relevant amount of actual, probable or intended loss under Section 2F1.1(b)(1) of the Sentencing Guidelines resulting from the offense committed in this case is \$13 million.

b. More than minimal planning: That the offense involved more than minimal planning and a scheme to defraud more than one victim, pursuant to Sections 2F1.1(b)(2)(A) & (B) of the Sentencing Guidelines.

c. Mass marketing: That the offense was committed through mass marketing, pursuant to Section 2F1.1(b)(3) of the Sentencing Guidelines.

d. Acting on Behalf of Charitable/Educational/Religious Organization: That the offense involved a misrepresentation that the defendant and his co-conspirators were acting on behalf of a charitable, educational, religious or political organization, pursuant to Section 2F1.1(b)(4)(A) of the Sentencing Guidelines.

e. Sophisticated Means: That offense involved sophisticated means, pursuant to Section 2F1.1(b)(6)(C) of the Sentencing Guidelines.

13. The defendant is aware that the sentence has not yet been determined by the court. The defendant also is aware that any estimate of the probable sentencing range or sentence that the defendant may receive, whether that estimate comes from the defendant's attorney, the government, or the probation office, is a prediction, not a promise, and is not binding on the government, the probation office or the court. The defendant understands further that any recommendation that the

government makes to the court as to sentencing, whether pursuant to this agreement or otherwise, is not binding on the court and the court may disregard the recommendation in its entirety. The defendant understands and acknowledges, as previously acknowledged in paragraph three (3) above, that the defendant may not withdraw his/her plea based upon the court's decision not to accept a sentencing recommendation made by the defendant, the government, or a recommendation made jointly by both the defendant and the government.

14. The defendant is aware that Title 18, United States Code, Section 3742 affords the defendant the right to appeal the sentence imposed in this case. Acknowledging this, in exchange for the undertakings made by the United States in this plea agreement, the defendant hereby waives all rights conferred by Section 3742 to appeal any sentence imposed, including any restitution order, or to appeal the manner in which the sentence was imposed, unless the sentence exceeds the maximum permitted by statute or is the result of an upward departure from the guideline range that the court establishes at sentencing. The defendant further understands that nothing in this agreement shall affect the government's right and/or duty to appeal as set forth in Title 18, United States Code, Section 3742(b). However, if the United States appeals the defendant's sentence pursuant to Section 3742(b), the defendant shall be released from the above waiver of appellate rights. By signing this agreement, the defendant acknowledges that he has discussed the appeal waiver set forth in this agreement with his/her attorney. The defendant further agrees, together with the United States, to request that the district court enter a specific finding that the defendant's waiver of his/her right to appeal the sentence to be imposed in this case was knowing and voluntary.

15. The defendant stipulates that he is satisfied with his legal representation and he has thoroughly discussed and reviewed the government's case as well as any possible defenses and legal challenges the defendant might assert with his defense counsel.

16. By signing this agreement, the defendant acknowledges that he has discussed fully with his defense counsel this Plea Agreement and its consequences including the various waivers set forth herein, and that the defendant understands the nature and consequences of the Plea Agreement including the various waivers set forth herein. The defendant further agrees, together with the United States, to request that the Court enter a specific finding that the defendant's entry into this Plea Agreement, including the various waivers set forth herein, is both knowing and voluntary.

17. This is the entire agreement and understanding between the United States and the defendant. There are no other agreements, promises, representations, or understandings.
